First Family Biography

The Isaac Hutto Family

First Generation

1. Isaac Hutto (aka Isaac Haudot) was born about November 1697, in Silly-sur-Nied, Pays Messin, France, (today part of Moselle, Grand Est, France) and was baptized there at St. Anould Catholic Church on November 21, 1697. He was the son of Jean Haudot and Sara Loyal, who were both Protestants (Huguenots). Isaac married Maria Catharina Born on November 11, 1721, in at the French Reformed Church in Ernstweiler, Duchy of Palatine-Zweibrücken (today part of Zweibrücken, Rhineland-Palatinate, Germany). She was probably born about 1702, likely in the Duchy of Palatine-Zweibrücken. She was the daughter of Benedict Born and wife, Anna Margareth. Benedict was born in Hornbach, Duchy of Palatine-Zweibrücken, but both of his parents were Swiss Immigrants of the Reformed religion.

Isaac, along with his wife, Maria Catharina Born, and their children; Anna, Charles, Sarah and Peter, arrived in South Carolina in 1735. [5] After he completed his indentured servitude to pay his family's passage to South Carolina, he petitioned the council for his headright of 350 acres and a bounty on February 22, 1739, which was granted. [6] He had a survey of 350 acres in Orangeburgh Township on the northeast side of the Edisto River on Limestone Creek, and Town Lot 282, certified for him on July 25, 1739. [7] Isaac died suddenly on Saturday, August 15, 1752, in the evening, as he was going home on the path between his house and Orangeburgh Township. He was buried on his own plantation two days later. [8] After his death, Maria Catharina married Henry Mell aka Johann Heinrich Möll on Tuesday, April 24, 1753, at the church in Orangeburgh. [9]

Children of Isaac Hutto and Maria Catharina Born were:

- +2. a. Anna Hutto (aka Anna Eva Haudot) was born about December 19, 1722, in Ingweiler, Palatine-Zweibrücken (today part of Einöd, Homburg, Saarpfalz-Kreis, Saarland, Germany), and was baptized in Ernstweiler, December 25, 1722.^[10]
- +3. b. Charles Hutto (aka Jean Charles Louys Haudot) was born February 1, 1724, in Ingweiler and was baptized in Ernstweiler on February 6, 1724.^[11]
- +4. c. Sarah Hutto was born about late 1725 or early 1726, in the Duchy of Palatine-Zweibrücken.^[12]
- +5. d. Peter Hutto (aka Johann Peter Haudot) was born July 1, 1727, in Kohlhof, a small village in Palatine-Zweibrücken (today a part of Neunkirchen, Saarland, Germany) and was baptized in Neunkirchen on July 6, 1727.^[13]
 - 6. e. Catharine Louise Haudot was born March 9, 1729 in Ingweiler, and was baptized March 13, 1719, in Ernstweiler. She died August 30, 1729, and was buried there September 1, 1729.
- 7. f. Anna Barbara Haudot was born May 10, 1730, in Ingweiler and baptized the same day in Ernstweiler. [16] She died August 30, 1729, and was buried there September 1, 1729. [17]
- 8. g. Isaac Haudot was born January 7, 1732, in Ingweiler and was baptized in Ernstweiler on January 8, 1732.^[18] He died May 15, 1732, in Ingweiler and was buried there the next day.^[19]
- 9. h. Maria Catharina Louisa Haudot was born October 14, 1733, in Einöd. Palatine-Zweibrücken, and baptized October 18, 1733, in Ernstweiler. [20] She likely died on her way to South Carolina, as there is no burial record of her in Ernstweiler and she was not included in her father's land petition. [21]
- +10. i. Jacob Hutto was born probably about 1736, in Orangeburgh Township, South Carolina. [22]
- +11. j. Isaac Hutto was born after February 1739, in Orangeburgh Township, South Carolina. [23]
- +12. k. Benjamin Hutto was born probably about 1741, in Orangeburgh Township, South Carolina.^[24]

Second Generation

- 2. Anna Hutto aka Anna Eva Haudot was born about December 19, 1722, in Ingweiler, Palatine-Zweibrücken, and was baptized at the French Reformed Church in Ernstweiler on December 25, 1722. [25] She married Peter Griffiths on May 25, 1742 in Orangeburgh Township. [26] They had 3 children whose names were recorded in the Reverend John Giessendanner's Book of Record. They are as follows:
 - 13. a. Thomas Griffiths was born about 1747 in Orangeburgh Township and was bap tized there on February 3, 1747.^[27]

- 14. b. Catharina Griffiths was born about December 1748, in Orangeburgh Township and died there after 2 days illness on September 26, 1752. She was buried the next day. [28]
- 15. c. Anna Margaret Griffiths was born October 14, 1750, in Orangeburgh Township, and was baptized at the church there on October 16, 1750.^[29]
- 3. Charles Hutto aka Jean Charles Louys Haudot, was born February 1, 1724, in Ingweilerand was baptized at the French Reformed Church in Ernstweiler on February 6, 1724. [30] Charles married Anna Tshudy aka Anna Judy about 1745 in Orangeburgh Township. [31] She was born in December 1727, in Lausen (now in Basel-Landschaft Canton, Switzerland), and was baptized there December 21, 1727. [32] She was the daughter of Martin Tshudy (aka Martin Judy) and Anna Balmer.

They had the following children:

- 16. a. John Hutto was born about 1749, in Orangeburgh Township. He was named in various records between 1767 and 1773.^[33]
- 17. b. Carl Hutto was born about 1747, in Orangeburgh Township, and baptized there March 15, 1747. He died probably by 1755, as he had a brother named Charles born then as shown below. Carl is a Germanic version of Charles.
- 18. c. Jacob Hutto was born about 1749, in Orangeburgh Township. He was likely married to Hannah Weaver and was named in records between 1772 and 1786.^[35]
- 19. d. Susannah Hutto was born about 1751 in Orangeburgh Township, and died there at the age of 1, on August 17, 1752. She was buried the same day and in the same grave with her grandfather, Isaac Hutto.^[36]
- 20. e. John Henry Hutto aka Henry Hutto was born May 26, 1753, in Orangeburgh Township and was baptized at the church there on June 10, 1753. His uncle, Jacob Judy, was one of his baptismal sponsors.^[37]
- 21. f. Charles Hutto was born in 1755 in Orangeburgh Township, and was baptized at the church there on January 25, 1756. His sponsors included his uncle, Jacob Hutto, and his aunt, Anna Hutto Griffiths.^[38]
- 22. g. Isaac Hutto was born March 23, 1758 in Orangeburgh Township, and was baptized at the church there on April 23, 1758. The sponsors included his uncle, Isaac Hutto, and Margaret Dietrich, who later married his uncle, Jacob Hutto.^[39]
- 23. h. Ulrick Hutto was born May 7, 1760, in Orangeburgh Township, and was baptized at the church there on May 18, 1760. His baptismal sponsors included his uncle and aunt, Christian Roth and wife, Elizabeth Judy Roth.^[40]

- 24. g. William Hutto was born about 1762, in Orangeburgh Township. He is listed in records from 1780 through 1812.^[41]
- 4. Sarah Hutto was born about 1725, likely in Palatine-Zweibrücken. She married Leonard Varnadoe sometime around 1745, likely in Orangeburgh Township.^[42]

They had at least 8 children:

- 25. a. Isaac Varnadoe was likely the oldest child, as he witnessed a Lease and Release from his uncles; Isaac, Jacob, and Benjamin Hutto to George McMichael in 1771. [43]
- 26. b. John Varnadoe was baptized in the house of Mr. Thomas Fort on March 1, 1747, in Orangeburgh Township.^[44]
- 27. c. Henry Varnadoe was born about October 1748, in Orangeburgh Township, [45] and died September 6, 1840, in Dooly County, Georgia. [46]
- 28. d. Leonard Varnadoe was born January 16, 1750, in Orangeburgh Township, and was baptized there August 19, 1750.^[47]
- 29. e. Sarah Varnadoe was born March 15, 1752, in Orangeburgh Township. [48]
- 30. f. Samuel Varnadoe was born February 15, 1754, in Orangeburgh Township and was baptized there August 25, 1754. [49]
- 31. g. Thomas Varnadoe was born May 12, 1756, in Orangeburgh Township and was baptized there on September 26, 1756.^[50]
- 32. h. Anna Varnadoe was born March 10, 1758, in Orangeburgh Township and was baptized there in September 14, 1758. [51]
- 5. Peter Hutto was born July 1, 1727, in Kohlhof, a small village in Palatine-Zweibrücken (today a part of Neunkirchen, Saarland, Germany) and was baptized in Neunkirchen on July 6, 1727. He married Margaret Barbara Shuler about 1749 in Orangeburgh Township. She was born in Krähenberg, Palatine-Zweibrücken in November 1728, and was baptized in Lambsborn, Palatine-Zweibrücken, on November 7, 1728. She was the daughter of Johann Jacob Shuler and Anna Margaretha Lauer.

Peter and Margaret Barbara had the following three children recorded in the Book of Record:

- 33. a. Isaac Hutto was born December 4, 1750, at Orangeburgh Township, and baptized at the church there on January 20, 1751.^[55]
- 34. b. Henry Hutto was born about 1752 in Orangeburgh Township and baptized there on December 25, 1752.^[56]

- 35. c. Martin Hutto was born April 18, 1755, in Orangeburgh Township and was baptized there on April 27, 1755.^[57]
- 10. Jacob Hutto was born probably born about 1736 in Orangeburgh Township, South Carolina. He married Margaret Dietrich aka Anna Maria Margaretha Dietrich sometime before June 1753, likely in Orangeburgh Township, when she was named as Jacob's wife in a baptism record of their nephew.^[58]
- 11. Isaac Hutto was born probably born after February 1739 in Orangeburgh Township, South Carolina.^[59] He married Anna sometime before 1771 as evidenced by her joinder in a Lease and Release with her husband.^[60]
- 12. Benjamin Hutto was born probably born about 1741, in Orangeburgh Township, South Carolina. He married Susannah Yonn widow of Martin Salley around 1763, in Orangeburgh Township, when she was named as Jacob's wife in a baptism record of their nephew. [61] On May 9, 1768, Benjamin was convicted of horse-stealing and burnt in the hand as his punishment. [62]

RESEARCH NOTES:

A. There is DNA evidence which suggests Peter Hodo of Georgia in the later 1700s is a Hutto family member, possibly even being the same person as Peter Hutto, due to his descendants Big Y-700 Haplogroup results and Y-DNA matching males in the Hutto Y-DNA Project. In addition, it is apparent that the James Emery Hutto, the founder of Hutto, Texas, is also part of the same family as the Hodos.
