

BARNWELL POW CAMP FIRST ORGANIZED IN FALL 1943 TO ASSIST FARMERS WITH LOCAL HARVEST OF PEANUTS AND COTTON

An estimated 25 camps built in South Carolina, most small 200 to 300 POWs in rural areas to help with harvest and work for loggers




