First Families of Orangeburgh District (SC)

WEAVER

(WEBER, WABER)

Though there could be other Weaver families who came to Orangeburgh, this narrative covers those who lived in and around Cow Castle below Orangeburgh Township. Of the First Generations shown here, only Nicholas came to South Carolina, along with his children. In addition, Nicholas Weaver's nephew, John Christopher Weaver, son of Johannes, immigrated at the same time.

Both Nicholas and Johannes were sons of Leonhard Weber. Since there are no church records for Neuenheim, Oberamt Heidelberg, Electoral Palatinate, in the period when Nicholas and Johannes were born the births are derived from their confirmation records. In addition, their father was listed in their respective marriage records. Later baptismal records for the youngest 2 children for Leonhard Weber show their mother as Elisabetha, but no maiden name is included.¹

By 1691, Leonhard Weber was a tenant at Alter Mönchhof [=Old Monk's Court] in Neuenheim, when the farm there was split between himself and another man named Nikolaus Gerlach. Leonhard had received houses 2 and 3, of the 4 houses on the property. The tenants were required to rebuild all the structures on the farm by 1692, which had been previously destroyed by the French during the War of Palatine Succession. In return they received "355 acres of farmland, 3 acres of vineyards, 12 acres of meadows, 6 acres of woodland, and four gardens within the courtyard's perimeter wall."² Because Leonard was living on this specific farm it made it clear that both Nicholas and Johannes were his sons. Their marriage records stated they were sons of Leonhard Weber, farm overseer/steward at the Mönchhof at Neuenheim.³

First Family Biographies

The Nicholas Weaver Family

FIRST GENERATION

1. HANß NICOLAUS WEBER aka Nicholas Weaver, the son of Leonhard Weber, was born about 1683, probably in Neuenheim, and was confirmed there on May 18, 1698, at the age of 14 years and several months.⁴ He died in Orangeburgh Township, South Carolina. He married ANNA BARBARA

MÄYER, daughter of Michael Mäyer, citizen of Altusried near Kempten, Circle of Swabia, on April 1, 1709, in Handschuhsheim, Oberamt Heidelberg, Electoral Palatinate.⁵ Sometime after Anna Barbara's death, Nicholas married Anna Maria Kern, a widow, of Dossenheim, Oberamt Heidelberg.⁶

On October 19, 1752, Nicholas petitioned the South Carolina Council stating he came to South Carolina aboard the Cunliffe with Captain Joseph Cleater from Rotterdam, and has a wife and one son Nicholas, about 20 years of age.⁷ He was granted 150 acres on Cow Castle Swap, a plat of which was certified on November 30, 1752.⁸ On September 2, 1755, Nicholas' son-in-law petitioned the Council on his behalf for bounty which had previously been denied on account of his age. Due to his "low circumstances" the bounty of provision was granted.⁹

On April 24 and 25, 1757, Nicholas conveyed his 150-acre tract to George Shuler.¹⁰ No other records for this Nicholas have been found.

Children of Hanß Nicolaus Weber aka Nicholas Weaver and Anna Barbara Mäyer were:

2. a. PHILIPPUS FRIEDERICH WEBER was born in March 1711 in Neuenheim and was baptized March 20, 1711.¹¹ He probably died sometime before February 1712, when his brother was baptized with the same name.¹²
3. b. PHILIPPUS FRIEDERICH WEBER was born in February 1712 in Neuenheim and was baptized February 22, 1712.¹³ He was confirmed April 1, 1725.¹⁴
4. c. ANNA CATHARINA WEBER was born in April 1715 in Neuenheim and baptized April 12, 1715.¹⁵ She probably died sometime before 1729, as she did not appear in the Confirmation records.¹⁶
- +5. d. ANNA ELIZABETH WEBER aka Elizabeth Weaver was born in October 1717 in Neuenheim.¹⁷ She died before 1764 in Charles Town.¹⁸
- +6. e. HANß GEORG WEBER aka George Weaver was born in February 1720 in Neuenheim.¹⁹ He died in Orangeburgh Township before August 1767.²⁰
7. f. CATHARINA ELISABETHA WEBER was a twin born in May 1723 in Neuenheim and baptized May 24, 1723.²¹ She probably died sometime before 1738, as she did not appear in the Confirmation records.²²
8. g. LEONHART WEBER was a twin born in May 1723 in Neuenheim and was baptized May 24, 1723.²³ He probably died sometime before 1738, as he did not appear in the Confirmation records.²⁴
- +9. h. JOHANNES WEBER aka John Weaver was born in December 1725 in Neuenheim.²⁵ He died sometime before February 1759 in Orangeburgh Township.²⁶

10. i. JOHANN NICOLAUS WEBER was born in Jun 1728 in Neuenheim and was baptized June 7, 1728.²⁷ He probably died before October 1730 when he had a brother baptized by the same name.²⁸
11. j. HANß REICHARTT WEBER was born in May 1729 in Neuenheim, and was baptized May 29, 1729.²⁹ He probably died sometime before 1744, as he did not appear in the Confirmation records.³⁰
- +12. k. JOHANN NICOLAUS WEBER aka Nicholas Weaver was born October 1730 in Neuenheim.³¹ He died in Orangeburgh District, South Carolina, after 1800.³²

SECOND GENERATION

5. ANNA ELIZABETH WEBER aka Elizabeth Weaver was born October 1717 in Neuenheim and baptized October 29, 1717.³³ She was confirmed there in 1731, at the age of 14.³⁴ Elizabeth married Friederich Strubel aka Frederick Strouble of "Lancaster in Pennsylvania", on April 18, 1741, in Neuenheim.³⁵ Elizabeth died in Charles Town, South Carolina, sometime before her husband's will, which was dated May 2, 1764. In his will, he mentions his wife, Mary, and the five children named below. Frederick died shortly after he wrote his will as it was probated 10 days later.³⁶

Frederick petitioned the South Carolina Council for 250 acres on March 6, 1755. His petition stated he had come about 13 years earlier but had found work and never applied. He also that stated he had a wife and three children. His request was heard and granted on April 1, 1755.³⁷ His survey of 250 acres in the Proprietary County of Granville, South Carolina, was certified for him on February 19, 1756.³⁸

Children of Frederick Strouble and Elizabeth Weaver were:

13. a. JOHN STROUBLE was probably born between 1742 and 1745 in Charles Town, SC, as he was the first son named in the list of children in his father's Will.³⁹
14. b. ELIZABETH STROUBLE was born February 15, 1746, in Charles Town, and was baptized there at St. Philip's Parish on March 1, 1746.⁴⁰
15. c. WILLIAM STROUBLE was probably born sometime between 1747 and the time of his father's petition in 1755, in Charles Town. He is named as the second son in his father's Will.⁴¹
16. d. MARY CATHARINA STROUBLE was born August 15, 1756, probably in Charles Town, and was baptized September 26, 1756, at the church in Orangeburgh.⁴²

17. e. JUDITH STROUBLE was born after 1757 in Charles Town and was the last named in her father's Will, which indicates she was probably the youngest of his children.⁴³

5. HANß GEORG WEBER aka George Weaver was born in February 1720 in Neuenheim and baptized February 18, 1720.⁴⁴ He was confirmed in 1733 in Neuenheim.⁴⁵ George died before August 14, 1767, below Orangeburgh Township.⁴⁶ He married his wife, Catharina (maiden name unknown), sometime before 1759 as evidenced by the baptisms of their children below.

George's petition to the South Carolina Council was dated October 19, 1752, stated he arrived on the Cunliffe and requested 50 acres and a bounty. It was approved the next day.⁴⁷ His petition made no mention of any family members, so the 50 acres would have been the proper headright. However, his land survey was for 150 acres on Cow Castle Swamp below Orangeburgh Township and was certified January 12, 1753.⁴⁸ The grant for the same, which adjoined his father's land, was issued January 12, 1753, and was delivered to his brother-in-law Frederick Strouble on July 12, 1758.⁴⁹

On August 14, 1767, Jacob Myers, "as next of kin" petitioned to administer the Estate of George Weaver, deceased.⁵⁰ The inventory for the Estate was filed December 14, 1767.⁵¹

Children of George Weaver and Catharina were:

18. a. ELIZABETH BARBARA WEAVER was born January 21, 1759, below Orangeburgh Township, and was baptized February 18, 1759, at the church in Orangeburgh.⁵²
19. b. MARIA BARBARA WEAVER was born May 23, 1760, below Orangeburgh Township, and was baptized June 15, 1760, at the church in Orangeburgh.⁵³

9. JOHANNES WEBER aka John Weaver was born in December 1725 in Neuenheim and baptized December 15, 1725.⁵⁴ He was confirmed in 1740 in Neuenheim.⁵⁵ He died below Orangeburgh Township sometime before February 18, 1759, as evidenced by his widow being named as a baptismal sponsor.⁵⁶ He married Elizabeth Kartner, daughter of George Friederich Kartner and Anna Christina Klenck, on July 20, 1751, in Grein, Amt Neckarsteinach, Holy Roman Empire.⁵⁷ She was born September 26, 1728, in Grein, and was baptized September 19, 1728, in Neckarsteinach, Amt Neckarsteinach, Holy Roman Empire.⁵⁸

On October 19, 1752, John petitioned the South Carolina Council stating he had arrived on the Cunliffe and has a wife and one child, Joanna, aged about 5 years. He requested 150 acres and a bounty. The petition was heard and granted the next day.⁵⁹ John's land adjoined that of his brother George Weaver to the northwest and contained 150 acres on Cow Castle Swamp below Orangeburgh Township. His survey was certified January 12, 1753.⁶⁰

Child of John Weaver and unknown female was:

20. a. JOANNA WEAVER was born about 1747, according to her age in George's petition, and probably in Oberamt Heidelberg.⁶¹ However, in his petition, he does not refer to her as his daughter but states he "has a wife and one child". No baptism record for her has been found.

Children of John Weaver and Elizabeth Kartner were:

21. a. MARY ELIZABETH WEAVER was born March 24, 1754, below Orangeburgh Township, and was baptized April 14, 1754, at the church in Orangeburgh.⁶²
22. b. MARY CATHARINA WEAVER was born September 9, 1755, below Orangeburgh Township, and was baptized November 16, 1755, at the church in Orangeburgh.⁶³
23. c. ELIZABETH BARBARA WEAVER was born June 9, 1757, below Orangeburgh Township, and was baptized July 17, 1757, at the church in Orangeburgh.⁶⁴

12. JOHANN NICOLAUS WEBER aka Nicholas Weaver was born probably in October 1730 in Neuenheim and was baptized October 5, 1730.⁶⁵ He was confirmed in Neuenheim in 1743 at the age of 13 years.⁶⁶ He married Maria Barbara (maiden name unknown) sometime before 1756, probably in or below Orangeburgh Township. He died sometime after 1800 in Orangeburgh District.⁶⁷

As previously mentioned, Nicholas was included in his father's petition to the South Carolina Council on October 19, 1752, stating they came to South Carolina aboard the Cunliffe.⁶⁸ On November 6, 1770, Nicholas had his own 200 acres surveyed for him on Cow Castle Swamp and certified 8 days later.⁶⁹ This land was further southeast on Cow Castle and adjoined the west side of Christina Antonine's land, while her land was just north of Charles Hutto.⁷⁰

In 1780, Nicholas served as a Sergeant in Captain Daniel Linder's Company of the Militia.⁷¹ He provided provisions and forage for the Continental Army during 1781 and 1782. He received payments for the same from 1784 through 1788.⁷²

In 1790 and 1800, he was living in Orangeburgh District.⁷³ There are no further records of him.

Children of Nicholas Weaver and Maria Barbara were:

24. a. HANNAH WEAVER was born September 24, 1756, below Orangeburgh Township, and was baptized October 24, 1756, at the church in Orangeburgh.⁷⁴ She was likely the wife of Jacob Hutto, son of Charles Hutto and Anna Tschudy.⁷⁵

25. b. NICHOLAS WEAVER was born likely sometime after 1760, below Orangeburgh Township. He is enumerated next to his father in the 1790 census of Orangeburgh District, and listed as Nicholas Weaver, Jr.⁷⁶ He is still living there as late as 1810.⁷⁷
26. c. PETER WEAVER was probably born before 1765 below Orangeburgh Township, as he had his first plat of 100 acres on Possom Branch of Cow Castle Swamp, certified for him on September 28, 1786. It adjoined his father to the north, Jacob Hutto to the east, and Henry Judy to the south.⁷⁸ He had a later plat of 284 acres certified for him on January 27, 1792. It was further east on Cow Castle Swamp, adjoining Henry Crook's land.⁷⁹ The purchase money for his 100 acres was paid by his father, Nicholas, out of the money due him from the Treasury for provision and forage. Both Nicholas and Peter signed the receipt.⁸⁰

Though he does not appear in any census in Orangeburgh District, a Peter Weaver does appear in the Charleston census in 1790 and 1800.⁸¹ It is not clear if this is the same Peter, but there are no more listings for a Peter Weaver in South Carolina.

The Johannes Weber Family

FIRST GENERATION

1. JOHANNES WEBER was probably born before 1689, in Neuenheim, Oberamt Heidelberg, Electoral Palatinate, and died January 8, 1753, in Leimen, Oberamt Heidelberg, Electoral Palatinate.⁸² He married Eleonora Magdalena Tÿauer, daughter of Ullrich Tÿrauer on September 20, 1713, in Handschuhsheim, Oberamt Heidelberg, Electoral Palatinate. The marriage record clearly stated he was the son of Leonhard Weber, farm overseer/steward at the Mönchhof at Neuenheim.⁸³

Though there were numerous children born to Johannes Weber and Eleonora Magdalena Tÿauer, only the following son came to South Carolina with his uncle and cousins:

- + 2. a. JOHANNES CHRISTOPH BALTHASAR WEBER aka John Cristopher Weaver was born about May 1716, in Leimen, Oberamt Heidelberg, Electoral Palatinate.⁸⁴

SECOND GENERATION

2. JOHANNES CHRISTOPH BALTHASAR WEBER aka John Christopher Weaver was born about May 1716, in Leimen, Oberamt Heidelberg, Electoral Palatinate, and was baptized there on May 17, 1716.⁸⁵ He was confirmed in Leimen on Easter 1729.⁸⁶ He married Susanna Margaretha (maiden name unknown), sometime in or before 1742, in Oberamt Heidelberg, as evidenced by their daughter's baptism.⁸⁷

On 19 Oct 1752, he petitioned the South Carolina Council stating he came aboard the Cunliffe and had paid his freight for himself and his family, including his child Anna Maria, about 10 years old. He requested to have 150 acres of land and to receive his bounty, which was granted. The petition had been brought to the Council Meeting on Friday, October 20, 1752, and was approved.⁸⁸

Christopher and his wife, Susanna, conveyed his land by Lease and Release dated February 19 and 20, 1756, to Henry Horger and his wife, Anna Catharina Utsey. They subsequently conveyed it to David Shuler by Lease and Release dated November 1 and 2, 1758.⁸⁹

- 3 a. ANNA MARIE WEAVER was born in October 1742, in Leimen, and was baptized there on October 31, 1742.⁹⁰

Family Migration

During the early and mid-Nineteenth century many descendants of the early Orangeburgh area families migrated to Alabama, Georgia, Florida, Arkansas, Texas, Mississippi, Louisiana and other points west. The information we have provided about a family's migration to another state is an attempt to document those migrations in order to assist family researchers in connecting their ancestors back to Orangeburgh or account for missing branches of their families.

At this time, we have no record of descendants with this surname having migrated to other states. If you have updated information, please share your documents with the Orangeburgh Genealogical Society.
